

Madness, Mayhem &Murder, the sequel to 2020's bestselling Daring, Devious & Deadly, is a collection of 16 more true tales of crime and justice, drawn from almost two centuries of Nova Scotia's history, from the province's first murder case in 1749 to its last execution in 1937. The cast includes pirates and privateers, terrorists, shadowy Confederate agents, and a motley crew of smugglers, thieves, killers, duel-fighting gentlemen, and a few people who were in the wrong place at the wrong time. These are stranger-than-fiction tales of crime and punishment, tragedy and redemption, and guilt and innocence, with a lot to say about the past – and the unending quest for justice.

Meet the larger-than-life characters from Nova Scotia's past who broke the law as well as the mold. Jack Randell, skipper of a Lunenburg-based rum-running schooner, sparked a diplomatic row in 1929 when he tried to outrun the United States Coast Guard. Henry More Smith was a nineteenth-century thief so brazen that he swiped law books from the office of a Halifax judge, then returned them to collect a reward. Samuel Herbert Dougal preyed on women and likely murdered two of his wives while serving with the British Army in Halifax in the 1880s. And Irish-American terrorists hatched a plot to blow up a Royal Navy warship anchored in Halifax Harbour in 1883. Their target? Prince George of Wales, a midshipman on board who would one day ascend to the British throne as King George V.



"My reason for being in the tavern was important. I wanted to better understand the history of beer in Nova Scotia. Or more specifically, I wanted to know how it was that Nova Scotians became the foremost makers and drinkers of the stuff. In truth, Canada had long ago tumbled down the consumption of beer per capita mountain among the world's nations, finding itself in paltry thirty-fourth place, lagging far behind beer-drinking powerhouses like Mexico and Botswana. And Nova Scotia, well, on average, Nova Scotians consumed only about eight litres per capita of beer per year, placing beery Bluenosers a scant eleventh among the provinces and territories, though we did have brew house bragging rights over the drinking denizens of Nunavut."

After extensive initial research, author Steven Laffoley discovered that the history of beer in Nova Scotia was as cloudy as a good pumpkin lager or a cold wheat beer on a dark winter's day. So with an intrepid, albeit mildly inebriated, explorer's courage, he packed up his notebook and set off in search of Nova Scotia's beer-filled past, which, as it turned out, was far stranger than he expected. It was a fascinating tale of heartwarming heroes, despicable villains, astounding secrets, and a gruesome murder or two, all with the added amusements of Victorian cross-dressing tavern patrons and a few goats with a passion for warm ale and chewing tobacco. And now the story can be told. You may want to pour a good glass of IPA for this.

Steven Laffoley is a writer, educator, and traveller. 

In this eclectic collection of both fiction and nonfiction, adult and children's stories, writers from the Atlantic Provinces describe Christmas and winter experiences that are both challenging and heartwarming, funny and serious, ridiculous and sublime. Readers of varied ages will enjoy the thrill of receiving an orange from Portugal in Hugh MacLennan's classic tale, the pathos of a lame boy who knows the true meaning of Christmas in an excerpt from Steven Laffoley's *A Halifax Christmas Carol*, Sharon and Mary O'Hara's childhood excitement of anticipating Santa from their home on the remote and fabled Sable Island. Mi'kmaw educator and advisor Theresa Meuse describes the ways in which the Mi'kmaq celebrate the season, both as Indigenous Peoples and as practicing Catholics. And Lindsay Ruck recalls the Christmas of 1991, when her repurposing of ordinary (and some might say throw-away) items for holiday gifts was at its zenith.



Sandra Phinney holds a mysterious gold-coloured "thing" in her hand on Christmas morning, puzzling over what it can be. In Budge Wilson's "The Imperfect Perfect Christmas," December 24 finds young Andrea Doucette feeling none of the holiday spirit as she ponders what sort of Christmas they will have this year. Janice Landry recalls the dollhouse her father Basil made for his granddaughter one special Christmas. Patrick O'Flaherty describes the hardships of a Newfoundland fisherman facing a difficult season in a hard, unforgiving landscape. And Farley Mowat tells us what snow means to people around the world: "settling in great flakes on a calm night over a vast city" or "slanting swiftly down across a cluster of tents huddled below a rock ridge on the arctic tundra."

Down Home for Christmas offers a rich tapestry of seasonal stories from some of Pottersfield Press's most talented and beloved authors and is sure to touch both those who love Christmas and those who enjoy the entire winter season in our rugged Down East region.



Here is the fascinating true story of how a poor girl from the Prairies rose above poverty and hardship to become the best known, and seemingly untouchable, madam in this country. Everyone from housewives to politicians knew her simply as Ada – the renowned madam of Canada's most notorious brothel at 51 Hollis Street in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

For more than four decades, Ada Jane McCallum and the women known as her girls offered sex for sale to the local gentry and to thousands of sailors, soldiers, and merchant seamen from around the world as they passed through the port city. Although she operated an illicit business, Ada was respected and earned a reputation as one who protected and treated her employees well, dealt with her clients with discretion and respect, and cultivated a remarkably tolerant relationship with the powers that be.

Madam of the Maritimes looks into McCallum's entry into the bustling brothel business during the war years, her three short-lived marriages, and her challenges with the law and Revenue Canada. It provides a look at Ada as seen through the eyes of some who knew her — a prostitute who worked for her for five years, her Halifax hairdresser in the 1950s, a retired judge who sentenced her in his court, an adoring

niece, a curious young reporter, and an anonymous client. As Ada's friend and Halifax journalist the late Doug Harkness once said, "She was part of our cultural life."

This story is not about the legality or morality of prostitution. Instead, it is about a respected and generous woman of class and dignity who made a name for herself in the world's oldest profession.




Jim Short doesn't want any trouble. Unfortunately, trouble tends to lurk everywhere. Even in quiet towns like Hethering, Nova Scotia. Lately, 17-year-old Mackenzie White has been hanging around Jim's bookstore, and if small-town gossip is to be believed, she has a knack for finding trouble wherever she goes. Sure enough, on the same night Jim makes the biggest sale of his career, he's held at gunpoint by a stranger in black and is robbed of all the cash in his register. Suddenly, Mackenzie's mischievous familiarity seems a useful resource. Jim's description of the thief bears a resemblance to a certain notorious criminal in the area, and Mackenzie claims to have an intimate knowledge of that same figure.

The unlikely duo take each other on as road trip partners, in an effort to track down the crook and gain redemption. Along the way, they swap origin stories and impart the wisdom of their respective worlds; he is loath to live a little, and she's a born disruptor. But countless hours of Maritime highway travel help them to discover that more unites them than divides.

This book delivers a series of clues about the backgrounds of its characters and the relatives who helped shape them. As more is revealed, the clearer it becomes that many of us are upholding the very same airs, but in different ways. With getaway cars, ineffectual police, and the heavy pressures of family history, *Short Mercy* is for anyone who knows small towns on the East Coast are as rife with mystery as anywhere.



In the spring of 2018, Brian Bartlett embarked on an experiment of going outdoors before sunrise to find what could be seen, heard, felt, and thought in the days' earlier hours. Composed of entries drafted over 18 months, *Daystart Songflight: A Morning Journal* combines nature writing, travel, autobiography, and reflections on reading. During in-the-field excursions Bartlett found more to learn about dawn, sunrise, and morning than he'd imagined; in his reading he encountered morning thoughts by many sorts of writers, including naturalists, poets, painters, religious figures, and translators from oral traditions.

Following in the footsteps of his earlier plein-air work, *Branches Over Ripples: A Waterside Journal*, Bartlett's new book is characterized by close observation, a curious mind, and a love for meandering. Bartlett is keen both to record the unique textures of particular mornings and to muse on how mornings overlap with each other. His layered prose is open to both concentration and digressiveness, poetry and science, memory and mindfulness, grief and humour. Aging, mortality, and climate change are realities the

author faces even while he observes and celebrates birds and other creatures, flowers and other plants, clouds and sunlight.



More than half of the journal's entries were written in and about sites in Nova Scotia (including Halifax, Colchester, Lunenburg, Hants, Kings, and Digby counties). Bartlett's travels also take him to other locations in the Atlantic Provinces, as well as to Maine, Montreal and Vancouver, southern Sweden, and northern California.

Brian Bartlett's 14 collections and chapbooks of poetry include *The Watchmaker's Table, Granite Erratics* and *The Afterlife of Trees*. His poetry has received the Atlantic Poetry Prize, the Acorn-Plantos Award for People's Poetry, and two *Malahat Review* Long Poem Prizes. He taught creative writing and literature at Saint Mary's University for nearly 30 years.



"These poems were first written from many different places, different views outside windows, different earth underfoot. Most are from the East Coast of Canada: Mahone Bay, where I have lived longest, Lunenburg, Guysborough, Cape Breton. Others further afield: Montreal, Ottawa, Banff, British Columbia, beloved Baffin Island. Some a touch exotic: Lancashire, Edinburgh, even distant Indonesia. The journey, across South, North, West, and finally East has not been aimless. It was always intended to bring me here, by the ocean. I was born by the sea on Prince Edward Island. My mother was born by the Irish Sea. My great-grandfather crossed the ocean arriving here from Russia. When I was young, my father shared poetry with me, including the work of the Russian poet Yevtushenko. I've shared my poems with many people since then as I am sharing them now with you, my reader. Thank you for coming on this little voyage."

In this collection of poetry the author takes us on a journey through personal relationships and internal struggles. Love is central to this travelling – the joy of love and the challenge of sustaining it – the pain only love can deliver – and ultimately the loss and grief when loved ones depart. Sixty poems are divided into four directions: Southbound, Northbound, Westbound, and Eastbound – warmth and happiness, ice and depression, being lost and finding home. The author's considerable travels are enunciated – within

the Maritimes, Western Canada, Nunavut, and abroad to the UK and Indonesia - giving colour to the experience associated with each.



Through a variety of styles, the author's voice emerges with passion and sometimes with humour. The speaking voice is direct and often conversational. Many of the poems are spoken to particular individuals, bringing the reader into honest, revealing conversations that arise from being completely inside a moment.

Heide's first collection of poetry, *Poems of a Very Simple Man*, was published by Fiddlehead Press. Writing primarily for the theatre, Heide has four books in print and has had dozens of plays professionally produced in almost every Canadian province and abroad. He has been the recipient of several awards for his writing. Heide is also well-known as a director and producer of both theatre and music.


